# Course Description: (from COSG)

This beginning course stresses basic conversational skills in German as well as simple reading and writing. Students will learn about the culture of German-speaking countries through internet activities, videos, and projects. The curriculum is focused on listening and speaking at the novice ACTFL proficiency level.

### Enduring Understandings

- There are many reasons for learning German, including that speaking German is an important skill for success in a global society.
- The ratio between population and landmass is a significant difference between the U.S. and Germany.
- The German speaking countries have many unique physical and geographic characteristics, with some similarities but also differences, to the U.S.
- Greetings in the German-speaking culture indicates degrees of respect and familiarity
- Becoming acquainted with new people involves an exchange of personal information such as name and age, and where they are from
- There are many types of families, varying in size, age, gender, appearance, and economic status
- Families live in a wide variety of homes and apartments.
- The standard of living in the German-speaking countries is similar to but also different from that of the United States.
- Free time activities depend on individual taste, ability, and opportunity, such as where you live, and the resources at your disposal
- The way an individual is influenced by and interacts with his community is often reflected in his choice of leisure activities
- The seasons, weather and physical location affect what one does after school and on

weekends

- Choosing and attending a school in a German-speaking country and in the U.S. are influenced by a family's socio-economic and cultural background
- The curriculum, grading system and diplomas offered in German-speaking schools are different from those in American schools.
- The weather plays an important role in determining our daily plans.
- Germany, Austria and Switzerland enjoy a varied climate and experience all four seasons.
- Geographical features can create unique weather patterns.
- Weather forecasts can be accessed from a wide range of sources.
- Choices about what to do for social activities are personal but are also influenced by cultural, historical and socio-economic factors.
- Teenagers in Germany, Austria and Switzerland enjoy considerable freedom when they go out with their friends.
- Making plans with friends includes dialogue and agreement.
- German teenagers have many of the same but also different options for entertainment compared to American teenagers.

## Performance Tasks: (Including Capstone Assured Experiences)

- 1. Create and label a map of Germany, Austria and Switzerland
- 2. Locate the countries surrounding Germany, Austria and Switzerland and provide their German names
- 3. Ask someone's name and reply
- 4. State and spell their own names in German
- 5. Count from 1 to 20 in German
- 6. Say the German alphabet
- 7. Ask what something is in the classroom and reply using definite and indefinite articles
- 8. Recognize important events and figures in German history
- 9. Recognize and state major abbreviations from the German-speaking culture (BRD, BMW, UBS)
- 10. Identify German cognates in English
- 11. Judge correctly when to use "du" to denote familiarity and "Sie" to show respect and/or lack of familiarity by role-playing a scene in which they greet family members, peers and strangers using a variety of appropriate forms and conventions.
- 12. Question one other about their name, age and where they are from, and about their transportation to and from school.
- 13. Listen to and respond appropriately to questions about their name, age, where they are from, and their transportation to school.
- 14. Draw conclusions about the information they have received
- 15. Watch a video and identify key information about the students in the video
- 16. Describe relationships within the extended family using specific vocabulary for relatives and pets.
- 17. Describe the physical appearance and age of family members and pets.
- 18. Read and discuss a survey about German smartphone usage.
- 19. Read and discuss a dialogue about teens planning an outing downtown.
- 20. Describe recreational activities using "spielen" and other expressions that indicate sports

and hobbies

- 21. Inquire about another person's preferences
- 22. Express one's likes and dislikes in the choices of recreational activities in one's environment
- 23. State expressions of time, location and frequency to specify their free-time choices
- 24. React to another person's preferences and state an opinion
- 25. Express time using the 24-hour clock
- 26. Use a German airline schedule to plan travel based on specific travel goals
- 27. State the school subjects taken in German-speaking high schools (*Gymnasium*)
- 28. Discuss subjects taken using the irregular verb "haben"
- 29. Express likes, dislikes and favorites regarding school courses
- 30. Use a schedule to talk about the sequence of classes
- 31. Differentiate between how grades are given on German and American report cards
- 32. Express a need to purchase school-related items in a store
- 33. Describe the current weather conditions where they live as well as in German-speaking cities of their choice
- 34. Convert the temperature from Fahrenheit to Celsius
- 35. Compare and contrast weather conditions in different seasons in Germany and the USA.
- 36. Talk about activities they can do during the different months and seasons based on weather conditions
- 37. Express a need to purchase items in a store
- 38. Ask for and name items in a store and comment on price
- 39. Comment on how you like various items
- 40. Discuss the different social activities available to young people in German-speaking countries.
- 41. Express a preference for these activities, using the verb "*mögen, möchten, müssen, dürfen, können, sollen*" and correct sentence structure.
- 42. Ask about and state a specific time and place for meeting.
- 43. Read and order from a restaurant menu.
- 44. Ask for opinions about food and drink in a public place, and respond appropriately
- 45. Pay a bill and give a tip.
- 46. Read and comment on the time, date, location and price on a concert or movie advertisement.
- 47. Ask and answer questions about food using direct object pronouns and definite and indefinite articles related to food.
- 48. Identify the unique food offerings in German, Austrian and Swiss restaurants and cafes.
